In addition to physical renovations — they're incorporating brand new DQ Grill and Chill and Orange Julius options — Winn said the atmosphere will be getting a facelift as well.

"It will be totally different — more casual and more upscale," he said.

Although Dairy Queen is a national franchise, each Dairy Queen restaurant is individually owned and operated, Winn said. This provides each owner with a bit of creative license, allowing them to serve up DQ's tasty treats in their own unique way.

A Dairy Queen's vibe "depends on the person who's running it — and the workers," Winn said.

At the South Williamsport branch,

it's all about friendly service.

Winn said his amicable staff are always dishing up great customer service along with the food. "I think that gets people to keep coming back," he said.

In addition to their famous array of frosty desserts, Dairy Queen's menu includes lunch and dinner fare, such as sandwiches, chicken strips, burgers, hot dogs and fries.

Blizzards, soft-serve ice cream infused with candy bits, remains the most popular ice cream product, but "cakes are a big item too," Winn said. Or combine the best of both worlds and order a Blizzard cake. After you choose a favorite Blizzard flavor with "whatever kind of ice cream you want," the DQ folk will layer it with fudge, freeze it, frost it, then add blizzard toppings.

"We're a great place for a great treat," Winn said.

He expects the renovations to be completed by mid-April, although the restaurant is open for business now.

According to Steve, tennis is a sport that you can begin — or return to — at any age, unlike some rough-and-tumble activities like football or dance.

"Tennis is the perfect thing to come back to," he said. "It's a great feeling when you have customers laughing and having fun like kids again."

"You outgrow a lot of sports, but not tennis," agreed Kelle Racine, program and events coordinator for the club, which is at 840 Route 15.

The air-conditioned facility, whose members range in age from 4 to 86, is equipped with six indoor courts, as well as a pro shop and locker rooms.

Promising an option for every age or experience level, programs at the tennis club include group beginner instruction for adults, junior clinics for ages 8 to 18, Pee Wee tennis for ages 4 to 7 and Cardio Tennis, as well as private lessons.

Each of West Branch Tennis Club's experienced instructors have been certified by the Professional Tennis Registry.

The registry, which is headquartered in Hilton Head Island, N.C., named the club its 2006 "Facility of the Year," recognizing its outstanding commitment to the promotion of the sport.
